Fairburn School's commitment to the principles of the Treaty of Waitangi is reflected through the following:

## Partnership and consultation

We recognise and value all cultures at our school and acknowledge the special position of Māori in New Zealand society. We work together to achieve the best environment for success for our students. We will seek advice cultural advice as appropriate and consult with our Māori community in creating and maintaining our school charter/strategic plan so that it reflects local tikanga Māori, mātauranga Māori, and te ao Māori.

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### **Protection and self-determination**

Our work encompasses: valuing and protecting local knowledge of the area and whakapapa of the land through our local curriculum and meaningfully incorporating te reo Māori and tikanga Māori into everyday life at Fairburn School.At We take all reasonable steps to offer support in teaching in te reo Māori and tikanga Māori for teachers and leaders

## **Participation**

At Fairburn School we promote equitable Māori achievement and equal opportunities for all members of the school community, including our staff and our students who need extra support at school. We work to strengthen home school relationships and ensure aspirations of whānau are reflected in school planning .

The principles and practices of Tataiako under pin our day-to-day work.

# WHANAUNGATANGA:

We actively engage in respectful working relationships with tamariki Māori, whānau, hāpu iwi and the Māori community

## **MANAAKITANGA:**

Demonstrate integrity, sincerity and respect towards Māori beliefs, language and culture teachers care for their as culturally located human beings above all else.

#### **TANGATA WHENUATANGA:**

Affirm Māori learners as Māori – provides contexts for learning where the identity, language and culture ('cultural locatedness') of Māori learners and their whānau is affirmed

#### AKO:

Teachers take responsibility for their own learning and that of Māori learners. Teachers can use strategies that promote effective teaching interactions and relationships with their learners.

#### **WĀNANGA:**

Participate with akonga and communicate in robust dialogue for the benefit of Māori akonga achievement. teachers are able to engage in effective teaching interactions with Māori students as Māori.
